The Royal Australasian College of Physicians (RACP) is initiating a program called EVOLVE. This arises from international initiatives to identify areas of clinical practice which are outside of current guidelines and/or are not cost effective - the avoidance of which could result in significant savings to the healthcare system. The RACP is aiming for all medical subspecialty societies to come up with five such clinical practices a "Top 5 practices to avoid" within the subspecialty.

The ESA Medical Affairs sub-committee along with Jason Soon from the RACP have put together a short list of 8 possible avoidable clinical practices within endocrinology. We seek input from ESA members who are practising clinicians to vote on their "Top 5".

Overseeing biosimilar use - CATAG release of Guiding Principles

Biological drugs such as proteins and peptides are produced by complex processes that include the use of recombinant protein expression in various organisms. Because of this complexity, the same biological produced by a different drug company after a patent expires is not identical despite having the same amino acid sequence. For example, there may be differences in post-translational modifications and trace impurities, and these may have biologically relevant effects. These copies are therefore called biosimilars rather than generics and it cannot be assumed that they are identical in all ways to the original. This is particularly relevant to endocrinologists as the first biosimilar insulin (of glargine insulin) has been approved in the EU, has tentative approval in the US, and the PBAC has recommended including it on the PBS here. The document provides guidelines for the use of biosimilars in Australian hospitals.

Implementation of the new PBS testosterone criteria

Andrology Australia and the Endocrine Society of Australia have released an <u>advisory note</u> on the implementation of the new PBS criteria for the prescription of testosterone.

In April the Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee (PBAC) announced new criteria for prescription of testosterone on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS). The new criteria contain two major changes to the way testosterone is prescribed on the PBS.

The first is that local doctors will no longer be able to continue to prescribe testosterone treatment without having the diagnosis validated by a specialist (endocrinologist, urologist, or member of the Australasian Chapter of Sexual Health Medicine). At the time of authority being obtained a date for an appointment and the name of a specialist must be included by the local doctor.

The second change relates to the prescription of androgens for men over the age of 40 who do not have a defined pituitary or testicular disorder. For these men to receive PBS support, the threshold testosterone level in the bloodstream has been lowered from 8 nmol per litre to 6 nmol per litre, effectively tightening the criteria.

Andrology Australia has received numerous enquiries since we published this news in the Autumn 2015 issue of <u>*The Healthy Male.*</u> In response, we have prepared an <u>advisory note</u>, in cooperation with the <u>The Endocrine Society of Australia</u>, which offers some suggestions that may assist with understanding the changes and implementing the new PBS criteria.

Endocrine Feature Day

Day-2 has an endocrine disease focus with the keynote address on phaeochromocytoma by Prof Graeme Eisenhofer. The afternoon plenary experts are Michael Stowasser to give the aldosterone counterpoint to the Eisenhofer address and Prof Ken Ho who will deliver a frank appraisal on adequacy of current laboratory tests for pituitary disease.

A/Prof Ann McCormack who leads the Hormones and Cancer group at the Garvan Institute of Medical Research and St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney and the Sydney Pituitary Collaborative Group will focus on cortisol assays and how assay performance directly impacts on monitoring of Cushing's patients.

During the ESA feature day there will be 9 speakers with significant expertise. Prof Carolyn Sue, Director of Neurogenetics at Royal North Shore Hospital, University of Sydney, and Director of the National Centre for Adult Stem Cell Research will speak on her experience with FGF 21 testing and importance as an emerging marker of metabolic status. Invited speakers are A/Prof Anju Johan from Monash who set up Australia's first non-fertility based PCOS centre, Prof Iain Clarke also from Monash who is the Australian expert on neuropeptide function and Prof David Kennaway from Adelaide on neuro-metabolic rhythms that underscore health and are disrupted in many chronic diseases. We also feature the expertise and experience of 4 outstanding scientists in Sydney; Catherine Woolnough, Diana Benn, Lyn Boscato and Michael Wright.
