As your new President, my first action was to ask five past Presidents for advice. They were unanimous: "Leave the country now". I am therefore writing this report from Aranjuez, a small village south of Madrid. I have learnt three relevant things while in Spain;

- 1) The grandest palaces (Palacio Real in Aranjuez, Al Hambra in Granada and Elcazar in Seville) were built by leaders just before their fall from power. Those leaders who lasted longest showed humility, good judgement and listened to their subjects. This seems like a good model.
- 2) Spain expelled the Jews and Moslems in the 15th and 16th Centuries. There followed 300 years of stagnation (called by some Spain's Golden Age). Homogeneity was the guiding principle. I do not think this is a good approach for ESA. We are the only society representing all of endocrinology. We need to remain diverse and appealing to all endocrinologists, both scientist and clinician. We need to encourage those members in more specialised societies to also remain with ESA.
- 3) Finally, I went to visit the bearded lady in Toledo. In her painting she stands there breast-feeding her 7<sup>th</sup> child. The guide kindly explained to me that she had an adrenal tumour. When I

enquired how she managed to get pregnant while growing a beard, all communication between guide and visitor ceased. There is a lot we don't know in endocrinology. Education and research remain the fundamental goals of ESA. We need to ensure scientists have adequate educational pathways and career structures. We need to ensure clinicians feel they can get their ongoing education through ESA meetings.

I have a number of people to thank, including Ben Canny and the previous Council, Cathie Coulter, Ross Cuneo, John Burgess and Bruce Robinson for leaving the Society in a financially healthy and scientifically vibrant state with a membership in excess of 800. The Society has been active in matters of policy and health by continuing to provide solicited advice to relevant government bodies, and formulated

position statements on key areas of endocrine therapeutics. I am fortunate to lead a strong council with Leon Bach as Vice President, Mark McLean as Secretary and Vicki Clifton as Treasurer, along with David Torpy, Catherine Choong, Evan Simpson and David Healy. Each member will be contributing to specific areas of ESA activities. David Torpy will oversee medical affairs, David Phillips will continue as the newsletter editor and Mark McLean will be handling matters related to the Royal College of Physicians. David Handelsman and Evan Simpson are the ESA representatives on the ISE Central Committee. The Council is delighted to be working with Stephen Twigg who is Chairman of the Program Organising Committee.

The 2005 ESA Annual Scientific Meeting will be held on 4-7th September 2005 at the Perth Convention Centre. The Council will be working with Stephen Twigg to ensure that this meeting will be of interest to the broadest possible range of our membership. The ESA Clinical Weekend, convened by Seng Khee Gan, will be held at the Novotel Vines Resort, Swan Valley, WA on 2-4th September 2005. Jennifer Conn will convene the ESA Seminar meeting which will be held at The Sebel Yarra Valley, Victoria, on 15-17th April 2005.

ESA will conduct a major restructure of the webpage. This restructure will enable members to access details of other members on-line, modify details of their own membership on-line, and pay



membership dues on-line. Ivone Johnson, ESA Secretariat, and Anne Kovach, RACP webmaster, will take on this restructure.

# ESA INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL GRANTS

**Purpose:** To support younger members of the Society to travel to international meetings, laboratories and/or clinics to further their training and knowledge in Endocrinology.

Eligibility: Applicants must have been financial members of ESA for at least 12 months prior to the closing date for applications. Applicants must possess a higher degree (MD, PhD or equivalent) and be within 5 years of the award of that degree. Compensation will be factored in for those applicants who have spent periods outside the workforce (due to illness, family leave, etc.). In these cases, the criterion of 5 years fulltime equivalence will be applied and the applicant must verify their absence from the workforce in the application. Applicants must be attending a recognized meeting of a learned society or organization within the general field of Endocrinology.

# REPORT ON THE ESA ANNUAL SCIENTIFIC MEETING (ASM), SYDNEY 2004

The 47th ESA ASM was held conjointly with the Society for Reproductive Biology (SRB), from August 23rd to 25th, 2004, at the Sydney Darling Harbour Convention Centre. It was attended by over 500 registrants. The four plenary speakers delivered state of the art lectures in topics of broad endocrine interest, with Hironobu Sasano in the third Japan-Australia Lecture, discussing 'Intracrinology of human breast cancer – intratumoral estrogen production', The Harrison Lecture by Bruce McEwen, entitled 'From molecule to mind: stress, allostasis, and integration of mind and body', the Taft Lecture by Peter Clayton on 'Translating growth hormone secretion into growth' and our other international plenary speaker, Aaron Hsueh on 'Hormone research based on evolutionary analysis of genomic data'. Five high quality symposia throughout the Meeting covered both clinical and basic topic areas, some in conjunction with the Neuroendocrine Society, ADS, APEG and SRB. There was a strong field of 12 free-oral communication sessions, and a more modest number of posters.

Congratulations go to the winner of the ESA Novartis Junior Investigator Award Winner for 2004, Esme Hatchell from the Laboratory for Cancer Medicine, Centre for Medical Research, Western Australian Institute for Medical Research, and School of Medicine and Pharmacology, the University of Western Australia, for her presentation entitled 'Cloning of a novel SRA-binding protein, SLIRP, that regulates estrogen action in cancer cells'. Congratulations to the other Novartis Award Finalists who presented on the day, Morton Burt, Andrew Redfern, Rachel Hill. Daniel Scott and Katie

Dixon. To reach the final in this hotly contested Award is a significant achievement in itself. Congratulations also to Peter Liu for winning the 2004 Servier Award for his published paper entitled, 'The short-term effect of high dose testosterone on sleep, breathing and function in older men', derived from clinical studies undertaken at the Anzac Institute in Sydney.

For the first time this year, ESA held the ESA Mayne Pharma Bryan Hudson Clinical Endocrinology Award. Congratulations to Sonia Davison from The Jean Hailes Foundation Research Unit, Victoria, winner of this inaugural clinical award. Sonia presented her work on 'Changes in androgen levels across the adult female life span and relationships to sexual function'. The Endocrine Society plans through this annual Award to attract an increasingly competitive field in presentations involving clinical endocrinology. Also stay tuned in subsequent reports outlining plans for Perth in 2005 where we aim to provide further options in the clinical endocrinology stream at the Annual Scientific Meeting, whilst in parallel maintaining quality scientific content at the Meeting.

Thanks to all the other members of the ESA ASM Program Organising Committee, Rory Clifton-Bligh, Charles Allan, Shaun McGrath, Paul Williams and associate editor, Anne Nelson, who each made major contributions towards the success of the Meeting scientific program.

# Announcing...Endocrinology – Version 3

# **Available October 2004**

# **Extensively revised**

A helpful first line resource for endocrine-related illness. Not only a challenging clinical area, but also one where there have been many changes in treatments in recent years.

As always, the writing group has produced useful, balanced and practical recommendations that represent an expert interpretation of the latest body of literature. # Major rewriting and additions include

- much new material on diabetes, its management and complications, including the metabolic syndrome and associated cardiovascular risk, diabetes in the elderly, management of impaired glucose tolerance, interpretation of screening tests, diet and exercise for type 2 diabetes, newer insulin analogues, and advice on the appropriate use of the Glycemic Index
- the chapter on osteoporosis has been rewritten and revised at length including upgraded discussion of the role of bisphosphonates in decreasing bone loss and increasing bone mineral density, the use of T-scores and Z-scores as part of the management plan, an expanded section on glucocorticoid-induced osteoporosis and a fuller discussion of the management of high risk groups
- an entire rewriting of the material on ovarian hormone replacement therapy in the light of the results from the recent Women's Health Initiative study, with new tables explaining the differences between available treatment options plus helpful aids to the selection of appropriate regimens for different clinical situations
- an expanded discussion of the lifestyle aspects of the management of overweight and obesity problems, the role of exercise and diet as well as behaviour modification strategies, plus a discussion of the new medications now available for the treatment of obesity
- an entirely new chapter on fluid and electrolyte abnormalities, including discussion of the common causes of high and low blood levels of magnesium, sodium and potassium
- considerable discussion of the newer medications available for the range of endocrine-related illness

# **Comprehensive revisions include:**

- androgen deficiency, including transdermal testosterone as an alternative first therapy
- disorders of bone and calcium homeostasis, including discussion of calcium and phosphorus blood levels
- androgenisation in women, with revision of the polycystic ovarian syndrome
- getting to know your drugs, including new material on thyrotropin alba and tibolone
- contraception issues, with significant revision to the section on postcoital contraception
- infertility, with an expanded table of the causes of anovulation, plus discussion about the induction of ovulation, using both lifestyle factors and pharmacotherapy
- male sexual dysfunction, including two new PDE5 inhibitors and a management algorithm
- menstrual disorders, including discussion of the treatment for dysmenorrhoea
- Paget's disease of bone, including monitoring and treatment options
- thyroid disorders, including a more interventional approach to mild thyroid deficiency states and subclinical thyrotoxicosis
- adrenal and pituitary disorders

As well as general endorsements applicable to all *Therapeutic Guideline* series, *Endocrinology 3* is endorsed by the Australian and New Zealand Bone and Mineral Society, the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine, the Australian Diabetes Society, The Endocrine Society of Australia, and the Royal Australasian College of Physicians.

# **Sponsorship**

This presents some risk to the "corporate memory" of the council, with only 3 members having experience. Accordingly, it is probably an opportune time to ask what is appropriate structure for council, do we need to consider the positions of "President-Elect" and "Past-President", in other words "is our constitution continuing to serve us?"

These issues will be canvassed in a discussion document that the outgoing council is preparing for the new council.

# 7. Treasurer's Report

The ESA Accounts have been Audited by P Gruchy & Associates. And will be signed off by the President and Treasurer. The Treasurer reports an overall annual profit of \$70, 619.

Major items of income: There are a few of items noted by our auditor which have contributed to a higher profit, as to compared with the previous financial year (\$46, 335). Primarily, due to the growth of the Asgard Fund – Managed Fund Investment. The incoming President will continue to develop strategies to overcome the decline in Corporate sponsorship

Major items of expenditure were: ASM – These costs are the travel expenses which are for the Plenary Speakers, and vary according to where they have to travel from. Investment Portfolio – grew, therefore no devaluation, which makes a significant contribution to the bottom line. The increase in the expenditure towards Travel grants is due to the cosponsorship of the Transpacific Symposium and the introduction of International Travel Grants (a total of \$7,500), and ICE travel grants (10 @\$2500).

2004 ASM, Sydney Convention Centre, NSW
